- Guidance: feedback on your proposal & project
- Resources: connections, equipment, \$\$
- Credentials: permits, IRB certification
- Ongoing mentoring: honors thesis, publication

Methods – Short-term, Specific Aims

- Driven by your big question & hypothesis avoid fishing expeditions!
- What exactly will you do? where, who, how, when
- Why use those methods? eg., survey vs. ethnography vs. documentary

Is it doable?

This summer, I will focus on the activism surrounding Foxconn factories, and specifically look at Hong Kong, the center of labor activism in China, as well as three cities with Foxconn branches: Shenzhen, Chengdu, and Kunshan. ... I am interested in the activists' backgrounds, how they build their campaigns, how they publicize their activities, and what their specific organizing and networking strategies are. ... By examining both the activists and the workers, my research aims to understand the movement in a more comprehensive manner.

This will be a qualitative research project, utilizing interviews and participant observation as the central methods of information gathering. I will be based in Hong Kong for the duration of my nine-week stay, and take five-day trips to each of the three cities listed above. First, I will begin by analyzing the activism work done in Hong Kong, specifically looking at SACOM, a Hong Kong-based non-profit organization founded in 2005 that aims to bring students, scholars, labor activists, and consumers together to monitor corporate behavior and to advocate for the rights of Chinese migrant workers. I plan to conduct indepth interviews, each with an individual activist or through attending and participating in staff meetings. For the interviews, I will prepare a set of predetermined questions, but mostly allow the interview the freedom and adaptability to unfold on its own. ...

Resources

- Logistics: equipment & materials, housing, transport, food & medical support
- Partners: Local officials, NGOs, collaborators
- Permissions: IRB (Institutional Review Board), travel permits, archives, collection
- Time: travel time, acclimation, downtime

Is it doable?

I am confident I will be able to work with SACOM and other labor NGOs, because my research advisor, Professor Ralph Litzinger, who is also an advisor at SACOM, and I have already been in contact with the organization about my research plan. Additionally, after helping to invite Mr. Han Dongfang, an advocate for workers' rights in China and a founding member of the Hong Kong based China Labor Bulletin, to Duke as a guest speaker for this year's China Leadership Summit, I have already established connections with him. These relations are extremely valuable in executing my research plans.

Is it doable? Evidence that this can really happen

Make a **Budget**

- Detailed: exactly what you need
- Real costs: document, avoid estimates
- Allowed expenses: eg, no personal items
- Justification: connect to your proposal
- Complete: all expenses, even if not funded
- Other Income: list all sources, co-funding is ok!

Presenting a Budget

Travel: \$2,000 airfare

\$500 in-country travel

Food:

Lodging: \$500 room and board (2 months)

Supplies & Equipment: \$500 vaccinations and malaria meds (coartem), \$1,000 start-up expenses: visa, cell

phone, mosquito net, room and board during orientation, assistant stipend, \$500

miscellaneous (phone credit, weekly supplies, internet, emergency needs)

Additional funding sources (applied):

Travel: Flight from Grand Forks, ND (GFK Airport) to Accra International Airport: \$2,470

In-country travel (daily travel throughout Accra to partnering institutions): \$240

Food: One meal per day not covered by host family:

\$3/day for 60 days: \$180

Lodging: Homestay Fee (includes 2 daily meals):

\$25/day for 60 days: \$1,500 Veronica and Edmond Kumordzie

Mempasem, Accra

Supplies & Equipment: Visa: \$60

Health and Medication (anti-malarial): \$60

Ghanaian cellphone: \$60

Internet: \$60

Assistant Stipend: \$150 (This money would be used to fund the transportation and assistance of a Ghanaian to help me around Accra when going to new partner institutions. A part-time assistant was tremendously helpful when conducting this

research previously.)

Misc supplies: \$100 (field notebooks, recorder, etc.)

Unanticipated Need: \$120



Can you pull it off?



Evidence of intellectual skills

- Relevant coursework
- Depth of thought evident in proposal

Evidence of Social skills

Language skills

Prior relevant experience in this (or similar) context

Savvy identification and consideration of social issues in proposal

- Potential cultural challenges
- Potential language challenges
- Potential travel challenges (ITOC approval)

Lastly, my fluency in Chinese will allow uninhibited communication with the activists and the migrant workers. Conducting interviews in the informants' native language is also beneficial in building trust and yielding thorough and accurate knowledge. Additionally, having conducted a Duke Engage independent project as well as studied abroad in China, I have had experience with traveling and working on my own in China. I am familiar with the customs and I am confident in my ability of getting around in the city and traveling in between cities.

Evidence of care and attention to detail

The proposal!

- Did you provide all information requested?
- Does the budget indicate that you have done your homework?
- Is the proposal thoroughly proofread and edited?

How to write a first-rate proposal

- 1. Get a mentor.
- 2. Make a checklist of things to figure out, things to do, and things to include. (Keep a close eye on the grant guidelines!)
- 3. Write a first draft well before the deadline.
- 4. Get as much good feedback as possible.
- 5. Attend workshop #2 (Feb 25/28).
- 6. Revise!
- 7. Proofread and edit like crazy!
